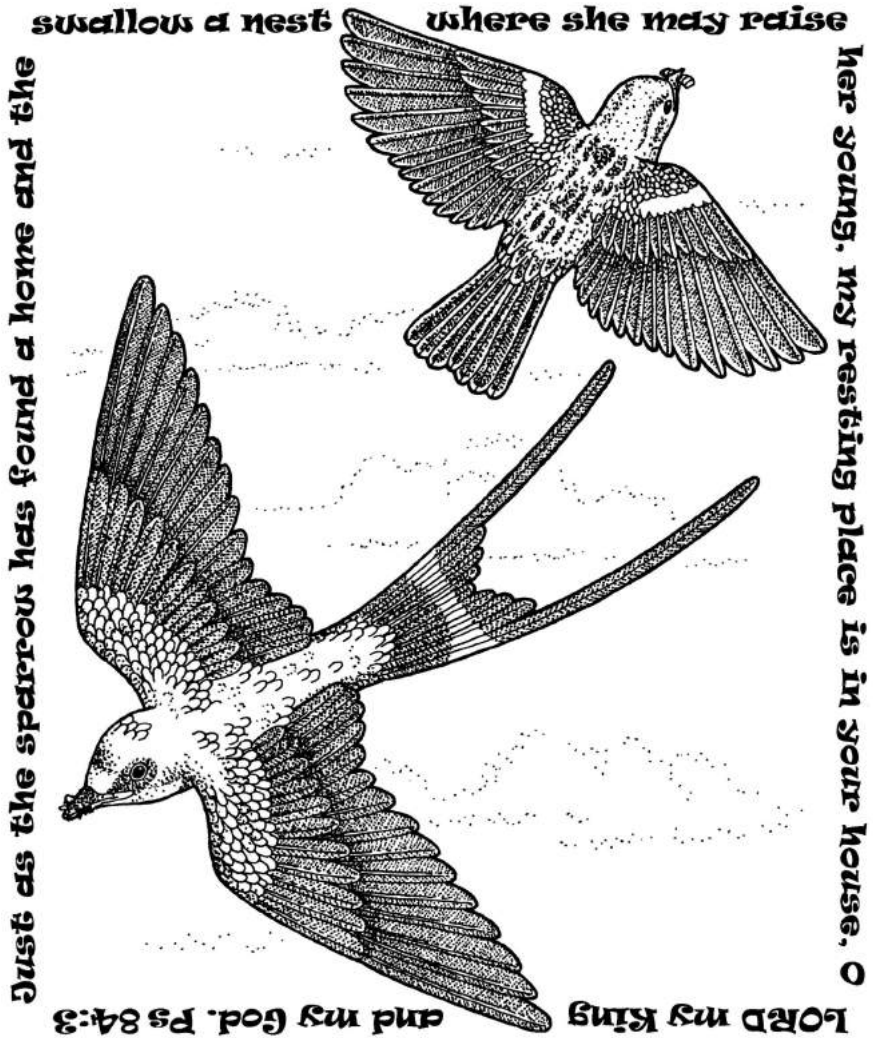

Dear Friends,

During World War II, King George VI called the nation to prayer more than once. Last year, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York called us to pray during the Covid Pandemic. This year, we have been asked to pray in response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

Every year Christians around the world take time from Ascension to Pentecost to pray. On Ascension Day, May 26th, we remember Jesus' commission to his followers to take the good news of God's love to everybody, as well as his promise that the Holy Spirit would help them do so.

Between Ascension and Pentecost we take the time to draw closer to God, to pray for those who need to know his love and to ask his Holy Spirit to help us share God's love with those around us.

It's not long since we celebrated Easter. We remembered the world-changing events when Jesus died and rose again. We know that Jesus offers us all the chance to know God's love, now and forever. Having received that great gift, it's our turn to pass it on to those we know and care about. And the first step is prayer. So let's take the time this month to pray "Thy kingdom come," that those we know may find the love of God in Jesus.

Learning to pray

Our Lent Group has been learning about prayer, based on the Lord's Prayer. We haven't quite finished the course we were working through, so there are another 3 sessions. Everyone is very welcome to join us.

Thy Kingdom Come 26th May - 7th June 2022 is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus. Since its start in May 2016 God has grown Thy Kingdom Come from a dream of possibility into a movement. Christians from 172 countries have taken part in praying 'Come Holy Spirit', so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ.

This praying together has been across our diversity and differences as every person, household and church are encouraged to pray in their own way. During the 11 days of *Thy Kingdom Come*, it is hoped that everyone who takes part will:

Deepen their own relationship with Jesus Christ

Pray for 5 friends or family to come to faith in Jesus

Pray for the empowerment of the Spirit that we would be effective in our witness

After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered with Mary, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Like them, our reliance on the gift of the Holy Spirit is total – on our own we can do nothing.

Through the centuries Christians have gathered at that time to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit. *Thy Kingdom Come* picks up this tradition. Over the years more and more worshipping communities have dedicated the days between Ascension and Pentecost to pray 'Come Holy Spirit'.

Prayer moves us closer not only to God, but to one another. It connects us with those whom we otherwise cannot see. Prayer breaks down division. In prayer we take each other's hands and find our safe stronghold.

**THE CHURCH
OF ENGLAND**

The Church of England has published a 'toolkit' of resources for parishes seeking to help refugees and evacuees from Ukraine in the wake of the Russian invasion of the country.

The material, available at <https://www.churchofengland.org/resources/community-action/war-ukraine-responding> brings together advice on how churches can welcome people arriving from Ukraine through giving, longer-term practical support such as community sponsorship, prayer and advocacy, as well as links to other sources of information including safeguarding.

In a foreword to the toolkit, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell, say that The Church calls on "all people of goodwill to join in prayer for the people of Ukraine and to work practically to support them in their hour of need."

They continue: "We have been inspired by the warm response from churches and community groups. We hope that in this toolkit there will be some useful answers.

"In these days of uncertainty and fear, we pray that each of us might again turn to the Lord and receive God's gift of peace, work for God's justice, and know God's reconciliation and love."

The toolkit includes a brief guide to what is happening in Ukraine and the humanitarian response, together with details of organisations and appeals.

It also contains information on how parishes and individuals can take action to support those arriving both through the family visa scheme and the humanitarian sponsor scheme, advocacy and prayer and theological resources for churches.

Tea with the Assistant Curate

The Revd Dr Stephen Pope

Stephen was born in Cardiff and trained to be a doctor in Liverpool. He spent five years specialising in anaesthetics before he decided he wanted a new challenge and trained to become a GP. He found a partnership in Benfleet, Essex and practised there for six years. Very sadly his first wife then died. When he remarried, his wife Pam was already established as a consultant in York and as his skills as a GP were more transferrable he moved to Yorkshire.

Stephen had two small children to look after so he took on locum work, including regular surgeries and out of hours duties for a surgery in Malton. Working part-time, Stephen had the opportunity to take a diploma in Chinese medicine. Chinese medicine has a totally different perspective from Western medicine which largely relies on looking at the patient's anatomy. Chinese medicine on the other hand looks at how well your energy is, or isn't, moving in the body.

Stephen was not sure how he would approach retirement. He wanted to spend more time travelling with Pam, but he prayed to God to find out if there was anything God wanted him to do. Some years before he had discussed with his sister, a priest, the idea of being ordained himself and she told him he would be too old.

One day Stephen was driving home from an area slightly outside his usual medical 'patch'. He went past the church in Marton. He knew the church as he attended the Celtic evening services held there from time to time. The urge came to visit the church even though it was mid-afternoon and Stephen was keen to get home to a belated lunch. He tried to resist but found himself reversing the car back and going into the church. He wandered down the aisle towards the altar rail. He wondered what it would be like to be on the other side of the altar. Checking there was nobody around to tell him not to, Stephen proceeded to the altar and as soon as he touched it he felt his arms shoot out and he said, "Welcome", while at the same time being aware of the sense of a congregation in the pews.

When he next saw the former Rector, Liz Hassall, he mentioned that he wanted to become a Reader. He told Liz about his experience at Marton and she said that it sounded more like a priestly calling. After Liz contacted the Diocesan Director of Ordinands, Stephen's path to becoming a priest commenced.

Stephen had to have a no-nonsense interview with the then Archbishop of York, John Sentamu. Luckily the Archbishop considered Stephen to be an appropriate candidate.

An intense part-time course of study then followed. Three years of study was squeezed into one. Stephen attended the Yorkshire Ministry Course, then based in Mirfield, undertaking double modules. The training included home study and weekend residential courses.

In 2016 Stephen was ordained as a Deacon. After one year he was re-interviewed by the Archbishop and deemed suitable for ordination as a priest, which took place in 2017.

Stephen explains that the word 'curate' is derived from 'cure' or 'care of souls'. A rector/vicar has responsibility for that and is the true curate, whilst the person who we usually view as the curate (like Stephen) is technically an assistant curate.

However, his sister was correct in one sense, he is too old to be appointed to a parish of his own.

Shortly after his curacy training ended, Liz Hassall left the Benefice (no connection between the two events!). Stephen did find himself working a bit harder during the vacancy, but he still does enjoy his role as Assistant Curate.

In his spare time, if there is any, Stephen enjoys music. He is a church organist (not so practical these days), a pianist and a flautist. He wrote the script and music for a Christmas play performed by Crayke School and Easter anthems for Crayke Church. Stephen is an enthusiastic tennis player. He also reads, bird watches and travels.

Local charities offering financial help If you live in the parish of Crayke or Coxwold (including Wass, Oulston and Thornton Hill), there are local charities which have funds available to help those in need.

Crayke Parochial Charities and the Fauconberg Trust each receive the rental income from certain fields that have been left in trust. The income can be used for any resident of those parishes.

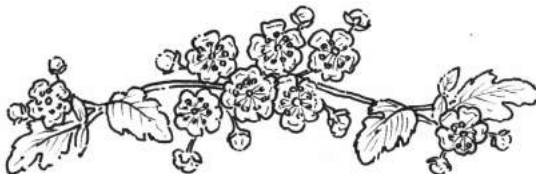


Over 50 people came to the last service and we shall welcome again all those who love a beautifully presented act of worship like this. There will be a short address.

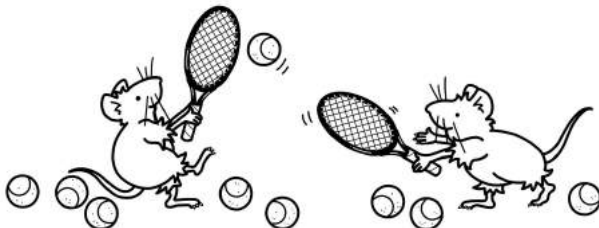

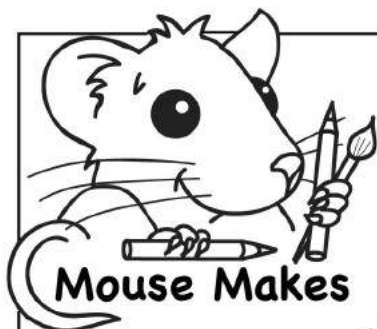
The future coffee mornings will be arranged by Janet Pepper. There are empty spaces in the diary for the Autumn please host one! They are a good way of meeting your neighbours.

In the Midst of the Garden – XXVII

When we moved into this cottage many moons ago we saw that it faced due South (on a good day we can see the Pennines from our front window) and what could be more jolly, we thought, than a conservatory built on its side. So, with the friendly assistance of the local Council, we set about it.

Now, if we read advertisements from companies which build such additions we often see a glorious space with sparkling floor, a small handful of flowers and a party of grinning people lounging on comfortable sofas and looking as if they might be waiting for the butler to bring in their afternoon tea. I'm afraid ours is not a bit like that. To start with the floor is made from a mass of rough, water-absorbent pampments which were once laid in an outhouse on Alison's dad's farm and we had been carrying round, to the alarm of removal men, from house to house for several decades. If we fling a couple of buckets of water on the floor one morning the sun will soon dry it all out.

"Why on earth would you want a floor like that?" you might ask. It's because our conservatory is built above all to accommodate pots and pots and pots of flowers. I can identify the simple ones. I have just counted, for example, that there are 43 different geraniums, practically all of which Alison will have created from cuttings. I recognize the lovely blue plumbago creeping up the wall and the arum lilies, in full flower as I write but probably too early for Easter decorations. For the rest, Alison tells me, there are clivia, jasmine, azaleas, datura (angel's trumpet), cacti, tradescantia, oxalis, begonias and (I bet you've never heard of this one – I think it's horrible!) kalanchoe or felt plant.

Of course many of these plants, outdoors in the summer, have to be brought inside each winter. So we have a space problem. And I say to Alison, "Look, Alison. Give the conservatory half an hour's sun in the winter and it becomes a place warm enough to sit in. So I insist that we have room for at least a couple of chairs the year round". So far we haven't come to blows about it.

In this season of renewal and new life we invite anyone with an interest in gardening to the first "in person" meeting of the Club in over two years.
